## Parish Council News

### *Inside this Issue*

The summer months are usually fairly quiet for the Parish Council with a big gap between our meeting on 28<sup>th</sup> June and the next one on 26<sup>th</sup> September. We hope that during this time we shall find one more person willing to give some time and effort to become the seventh member of the Parish Council. A suitable person can be co-opted without election but so far the people approached have been willing in principle but too heavily committed in other roles.

The wet weather and high winds played havoc with village signs and one of our smart new green dog bins had to be re-erected. We hope the bins will be used to help keep the walkways cleaner. There has also been heavy growth of hedges around the village. The owners of the hedges are responsible for their upkeep but we are hopeful that a new contractor is going to be able to spend a day or two in the village. Jeff Hallett has compiled a list of those he knows of who want their hedges cut so let him know if you think you may not be on the list or will not be around to pay on the day.

The village did not get through the first round of the “Village of the Year” competition. Judging was on the written application and perhaps an informal visit but we were not informed of any visit by the judges. This was our first application for some time but if we are to repeat in two years time we shall need encouragement and input from a wider group of the village.

There is no news so far of a new tenant or owner being found for the “Greyhound” pub. We are in occasional contact with the owners and there is a small but steady stream of prospective tenants visiting but so far no progress. We are grateful that the pub and garden is being kept reasonably tidy and secure.

The wooden seat beside the Greyhound is reaching the end of its useful life. It

is a memorial seat. It has 1910 on one half and 1935 on the other and was put there to commemorate the Silver Jubilee of King George V and Queen Mary. The Council is keen to keep a seat in that position for public use so we expect to have to raise money or use money in council funds that has already come from your council tax. Please let the Council know if you have any views or suggestions on this.

The Parish Plan survey is making steady progress. There was a return of questionnaires of 55.7% and a grant of £1,171 has been awarded by Suffolk ACRE, data from the survey is now being entered on the computer programme and Carol Edworthy will be preparing the report. Please attend when the report is presented to the village because that will be everyone's chance to help shape the future of the village and will be very important if changes of planning procedures are introduced.

A final thought is that we do not yet know how the change of Ipswich to a Unitary Authority will affect the service that we receive from Suffolk County Council. There are bound to be changes of allocation of funding and perhaps less money to go around the county as funds are allocated directly to Ipswich. We need to keep a close eye on this and inform our MPs of any problems that we see.

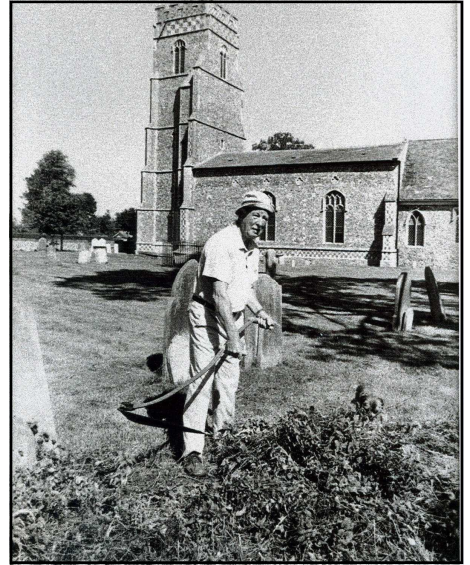
## Appreciation

Mum's parents, the five children (plus spouses), and all the grandchildren (a boyfriend too) went along to the Three Tunns for a surprise meal, celebrating with great food, great champagne and great company.

The celebrations continued for them with the surprise party at Wickham Market Village Hall. They arrived in style on Joe Arbon's horse and cart. The journey was very special for them, and Dad recalls thinking that he was going for another family meal perhaps to the Chinese or Indian restaurant! Family and friends at the hall, with warmth and great cheer, greeted them.

The hall was over-flowing with people young and old. Banners, old photographs, balloons, superb buffet, (supplied by us) family, friends and members of the community came from far and wide to celebrate and be part of this very special occasion.

To understand why this is, we have to go back more than 40 years, to when Mum and Dad moved to Pettistree from Boyton in 1965 with 5 very young children. They settled down to family life here in the village and despite being young and bringing up a family, they became an important part of the community. Mum talks fondly of the conversation she had with Mrs Bratt, "you are young, you are female... I'm putting your name forward to become a member of the parish council!" And so it began! Mum worked extremely hard (and continues to do so) always staying in the background, keeping out of the limelight, but working hard nonetheless. The early 70's also saw Mum becoming a Governor at Wickham Market School. Dad, always supportive, even though his job took him away from home, managed to start the Wickham Market football team with Mr Smith in the 1960's. In the early 90's Mum was part of a committee to take over the village hall. In 1993 the WI donated it to the village – what a great achievement that was. To this day we can't imagine how difficult it must have been, bringing up a family of 5, not to mention all they did for the community and others.

The community was and always will be important to both of them, but we all know where their hearts lie – with us! There has never been any doubt in our minds about the love, devotion and inspiration they have both shown all of us (we are speaking for the grandchildren too). They brought us up to believe in family values, to respect each other and to be good members of the community just like them! Any problems we have had over the years – and we all have them – have been made easier with the knowledge that we could always go to them, not necessarily for advice, (though when we needed it, it was always sound) but simply for support, a shoulder to cry on, some sympathy or empathy! We could not ask for better parents, never smothering us, letting us make our own mistakes and picking up the pieces when necessary.

The five of us fled the nest, married and have children of our own now. And their legacy has been passed down through the generations and will continue to do so. Thank you Mum and Dad – you are indeed amazing, wonderful and selfless people and we ALL feel very privileged to be a part of your lives! x

She officiated at the funeral of George Tyte on July 30<sup>th</sup>, Phyl Revett's cremation service on August 10<sup>th</sup> and also welcomed Harrison (Harry) Frost ( Dick & Rita Smith's grandson) into the family of the church by taking his christening on August 19<sup>th</sup>.

### Church Room development

### Special Services

Sept 30<sup>th</sup> will be another special event for the village as the Bishop of Dunwich will be speaking at the morning service. It is several years since we were visited by one of the Suffolk Bishops so it will be a great pleasure to welcome him. The following Sunday October 7<sup>th</sup> is the Harvest Festival service of Evensong when the speaker will be the Archdeacon of Suffolk The Ven. Geoffrey Arrand. The Archdeacon has been a regular visitor to our village for many years and is particularly remembered for the sermon he gave on the morning of the late Princess Diana's death 10 years ago. He spoke without notes, as he had only heard of the event as he drove to Pettistree that morning, and everyone who heard him found the rest of the week's events easier to deal with because of his helpful words. It will be a pleasure to welcome him again.

Visit of Suffolk History & Archaeology Society. On July 14<sup>th</sup> we were pleased to welcome the group to the village. After some refreshment in the village hall, where one member of the group became very excited about the hall itself, apparently a classic example of its type, they were taken to the church. Clive Paine, a very knowledgeable amateur church historian with an engaging teaching style, has researched the church building and its history in depth. This meant we were treated to a fascinating account by him and Edward Martin of how the building has probably evolved over the



centuries and many interesting snippets were gleaned. It appears that the mediaeval windows can be dated fairly accurately to between 1305 and 1307, and that 550 years later in 1847 the bulk of the original mediaeval pews had been removed by Mr Brooks and could be seen at Pettistree Lodge! ( Maybe Mrs Brooks felt guilty as she paid for the complete refurbishment in 1865 ) In spite of notes being taken at the time I am ashamed to have to report that I failed to get a full history but am delighted to report that Clive has offered to come on June 13<sup>th</sup> 2008 and give us ‘ An evening in Pettistree church’. He is famous for the talks he gives in aid of the Historic churches Trust and I hope that Pettistree will be able to enjoy an educational evening but with some light refreshment as well. Please put it in your diary.

## A Visit to The Mount & Canal

After visiting the church the thirty members of the Suffolk Institute of Archaeology and History led by Edward Martin made their way via the Green and Thong Hall Road to the “Great Mount of Pettistree.” (Hunn Wyard’s name for it) Walking this route enabled an appreciation of the distance from and siting of the Mount in relation to Pettistree Lodge to which it once belonged. With the aid of an Inventory of Pettistree Lodge at the time of Hunn Wyard’s death (1746) recently discovered in the Ipswich Record Office and sent to me by Ray Whitehand, Edward Martin was able to draw a word picture of the man who created these landscape features in the early part of the 18<sup>th</sup> century and who was very proud of what he had done.

Hunn Wyard was a bachelor and gentleman farmer who lived in Pettistree Lodge and farmed an extensive area around. He was quite well educated as evidenced by letters he wrote, perhaps from the writing desk in the Hall Chamber. We know he travelled about as there was a post chaise and harness in the barn and this may have given him the idea for the Mount and Canal. Also listed in the Hall Chamber was a case of brandy and in the closet his powder horn.

In the Parlour Chamber there was ‘one bed as it stands, thirty one comb of barley, four comb of wheat, and one comb of peas!’

But why did he create the Canal and Mount? He had a parcel of twelve deer grazing his land as well as some cows so he probably required a larger water supply—hence the Canal.(Anyway it was quite fashionable) In making the Canal there was a rather large heap of soil to deal with which, of course, could either be spread or heaped up. Hunn chose to make a heap about 8 metres high. This then was a convenient place for him to view his estate and watch his deer probably from a small building on the top evidenced by a piece of a 17<sup>th</sup> century bottle.

Everyone enjoyed the view from the top and agreed it had been a very enjoyable morning.

## Bell Ringing News

Six Pettistree Bellringers met early on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> August and rang a quarter peal before service. A quarter peal is a continuous piece of ringing, lasting about 40 minutes, made up from one or more methods. This means that the order of the bells in a row changes at every stroke. This was the 400<sup>th</sup> quarter since the bells were restored in 1986.

We are very fortunate that our practice is well supported and many local ringers from other towers join us regularly. Mike Whitby, who started training ringers here in 1986, still runs our practices. Ruth, who conducted the quarter peal, was taught to ring by Mike and me. Chris and I are two of the original learners from 1986.

## A New Top-Knot

Pettistree has a few thatched roofs but one of the smallest is on the summerhouse at The Laurels (visible from the Greyhound pub). The summerhouse is very old with proper lime mortar between the bricks and window glass only 1mm thick. (They could not make very flat glass so they made it very thin to get it as transparent as possible.). The roof has a reed thatch and that type of thatch can last 50 to 80 years depending on the position and pitch of the roof. Water reed cannot be bent, so long straw is used to finish the top of a thatched roof. This does not last so long and has to be replaced at least every 20 years. <http://www.buildingconservation.com/articles/thatchrf/thatchrf.htm> It was time to get the summerhouse re-capped this year so we naturally went to our village thatcher Roger Chilvers. He last did this for us about 20 years ago and said then that his father had put on the reed thatch about 20 years earlier. Interestingly we can see new thatch on the roof in an aerial photograph that we bought recently taken in 1965.



On this occasion Roger was laid up and off work but his assistant Paul Smy was able to come and do it for us. He was a little apprehensive because it is more complicated to finish a pointed roof than an ordinary long ridge on a house. Matters were further complicated by the summerhouse being an irregular five sided structure. However Paul was more than equal to the task and was helped by a spell of very dry weather in early May. Over three and a half days he removed the old bird-protection wire and worn out capping straw, and brushed the old reed clean (using a wooden 'brush' with horseshoe nails as 'bristles'. Fresh new long straw grown and harvested by Roger was bundled onto the top of the roof, fixed by split hazel laths and then cut to a decorative shape with three equal points. Finally new bird-protection wire mesh was fastened over the whole roof. Even this wire has to be specially obtained as ordinary mesh does not come in big enough sheets and does not lie completely flat.

We are delighted with the smart and weatherproof roof and we think that the great care Paul took to protect a nearby blackbird's nest led to a successful hatch of young. Now we have to try and stop those young blackbirds eating all our figs!
