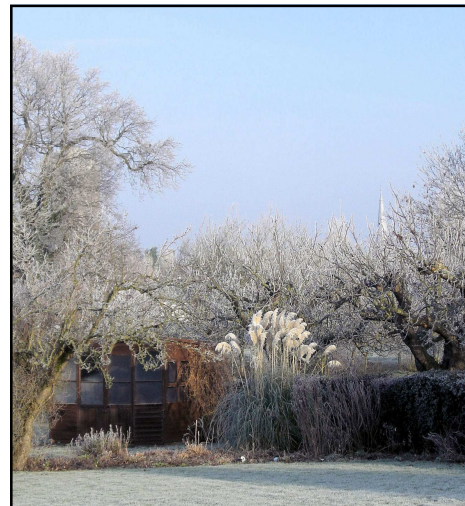

Aliens in the pub

Have you ever been in the pub on a Wednesday evening and wondered about the discussions you hear? The people seem ordinary enough, they drink the good beer and eat chips, they appear to speak in English, but my goodness the vocabulary is rather strange!spliced minor, variable treble, Grandsire, quarters, hand stroke etc

You've met the ringers then!

The bells have rung out across Pettistree just about every Wednesday and Sunday since December 1986, come rain or shine. Occasionally they are rung at other times too when visiting bands include our tower in their outing. Once a year the bells are muffled (more about that later) for Remembrance Day.

Three of the bells were cast in the middle of the 15th century whilst the other three were cast by Taylors of Loughborough in 1848. It's a real privilege to use such ancient artefacts whenever we ring. Although the bells are just below the louvres in the tower the ringers stand on the ground floor to ring, using about 50 feet of rope.

Some vocabulary:

Band: A group of ringers, 6 at Pettistree, one for each bell.

Sally: The fluffy piece on the bell rope which the ringer holds before pulling off at hand stroke.

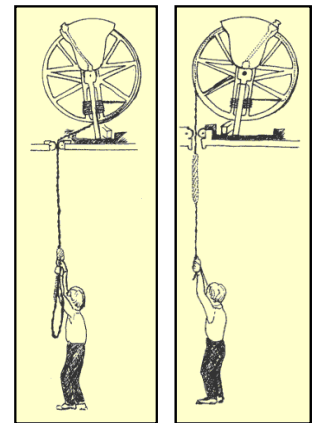
Tail end: The end of the rope, a double thickness, which the ringer holds at all times

Hand stroke and **back stroke** refer to the two parts of ringing the bell, **hand** is catching the **sally** at about head height, whilst **back** is guiding the rope down from above one's head. It's all connected with winding and unwinding the rope around the large wheel to which the bell is attached.

Rounds are heard when the bells sound in order highest to lowest.

Rounds and Call Changes are being rung when the listener can hear the same pattern repeated a few times before it changes to a new one. It is being controlled by one of the band, called the **conductor**, who instructs the ringers to change the order of the bells.

When the bells have a very frequent change of sound pattern the band is probably ringing a **method**. On our six bells we can either ring methods called **doubles** where five bells are mixed up and the lowest bell (the **tenor**) rings every 6 blows, **or minor** where all the bells get mixed up.



Whew! I think that's enough for now. More in the next edition.

Parish Council News

Jeff Hallett, Chairman of the Parish Council. November 2009.

Autumn is now well advanced and we all need to make preparations for the winter weather that is bound to come. Most roadside hedges have now been trimmed so visibility has improved generally. We are hopeful that the highways department of the County Council will do some clearing of the muddy centre of some of our lanes and will also cut back some of the grass verges that have encroached and narrowed some of the highways. The quantity of work that can be done will largely depend on the amount of county council money left in the SCC coffers.

The Parish Council is not predicting a particularly bad winter but it is purchasing two grit bins to be placed on the two corners that tend to be worst affected by ice in freezing weather. They will be paid for by a grant from the discretionary fund of our county councillor and they will be filled with salty grit by the highways department. It will then be up to registered volunteers in the village to spread the grit on those corners when ice is expected or has formed. The bins will be sited on the S-bend at Pettistree Grange and at Presmere Pond. We hope that this will make our roads a bit safer but users must still take care as they cannot rely on grit having always been applied.

The Parish Council takes its responsibility very seriously to review planning applications and pass its views back to Suffolk Coastal District Council (SCDC). Despite this we sometimes feel bemused at some of the decisions taken by the SCDC planners and by some of the advice that they give informally to applicants. This was raised with Mr Michael Bond, who as well as being our new county councillor, is still one of our district councillors. At our Parish Council meeting on 10th November he made it clear that he shares some of our concerns and he will be participating in a formal review of the SCDC planning process. He has offered to try and help any villagers who feel they are having problems with the planning process. We all want to support the preservation of the good points and character of the village while permitting essential modernisation and encouraging accommodation for a sustainable community.

A short questionnaire will be included with this newsletter to gauge the interest in the more thorough survey of housing needs that has been recommended by the County Council (SCC) and that could perhaps lead to the provision of some affordable or shared-ownership housing. The questionnaire can be anonymous and can be delivered to me at The Laurels.

We have also been asked by the County Council to circulate a survey on the availability and need for transport. Travel by car is not always efficient or even possible so we must make our needs clear if we want to preserve our reasonable bus service or perhaps develop a community transport scheme. This questionnaire can be sent by Freepost to the SCC.

The Parish Council has no direct responsibility for health-care but it does share the concerns of many local people over the uncertain out-of-hours medical cover provided by a commercial organisation. We have made our views known to those reviewing the cover and will wait with interest for the decisions of those commissioning the service that has replaced on-call cover by our own GPs.

On a brighter note several new families have moved into the village over the last few months and we look forward to welcoming them to the various village events planned for the next few months by the Church, the Village Hall Committee and the Heritage Committee. Details of the events appear elsewhere in this newsletter so please remember to support and attend them.

Police news

Autumn is upon us and the darker evenings are starting to set in. I would ask that you remain vigilant and advise you to ensure your houses and outbuildings are kept secure at all times.

Shed alarms can be purchased at the police station or from DIY stores for a relatively low price and most are fairly easy to install requiring only batteries to operate them.

Dusk to Dawn lighting for the exterior of your premises and timer switches are recommended for the interior. Again these items can be bought from DIY stores and the cost varies. Dusk to Dawn is light sensitive and uses low energy bulbs thus ensuring that it is only operating at the necessary times.

Analysis has shown that offenders don't like to commit crime when in the spotlight. Unlike the movement sensor security lights the dusk to dawn is on permanently throughout the evening/night and hopefully deterring any potential offenders.

Timer switches can be used in the house to ensure a light comes on and goes off at a time set by yourselves when you are away from the premises. The idea of this suggests someone is at home.

For those of you who haven't signed up for Police Direct yet, please don't forget about it! The service is free, easy to use and is proving to be a very valuable policing tool.

The service doesn't just assist us it also benefits you. You will receive regular updates either via text, email or landline letting you know what is happening in your area. Leaflets are available at all police stations or visit our website.

Jottings from St. Peter & St Paul's

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) decided to plan to have the church open during daylight hours so that everyone will be able to visit the church without any difficulty. We now require a few people to be responsible for unlocking and locking the door each day, this might suit a dog-walker or regular ramblers through the village. Hopefully with enough volunteers it will mean only one day a week to have to remember the task.

The PCC also discussed how best to provide some Car Parking near the church, as we are aware of, and regret, the inconvenience that has been caused at busy times to users of Walnuts Lane and The Street near The Greyhound. We are trying to find an acceptable solution while continuing to conserve both the wild-life habitat and ancient views around the church. We would welcome parishioners views on how to solve this problem and are consulting the Diocesan planning advisors.

In the August edition of Pettistree People I asked for practical help with applying for grants towards the re-decoration. Sadly no-one came forward, but I am still hopeful that someone from the community will offer to assist us with the paper/computer work needed to get the project underway. We are faced with a likely cost of £100,000 and the PCC decided that we have no choice but to try to raise this money over a couple of years, and get this essential work done. We have to remove all the emulsion that was applied on top of the existing limewash over 30 years ago, before re-painting. This work, plus the current safety rules which mean that the interior will have to be fully scaffolded, is why the estimate seems so high. We are requesting help with fund-raising ideas from the Diocesan Parish Resource adviser who can suggest many ways of obtaining outside funding.

Looking through the previous paragraphs looks as if the PCC is on a 'begging series' and while to a certain extent this may be true, it has arisen due to the importance of the church building to the village generally, and the increasing significance of the Church in Pettistree to the whole area. The mid-week communion services, Harvest Festival, the Act of Remembrance and the interest shown in our plans, mean that we have confidence in continuing to plan for the future at St Peter & St Paul's Church Pettistree.

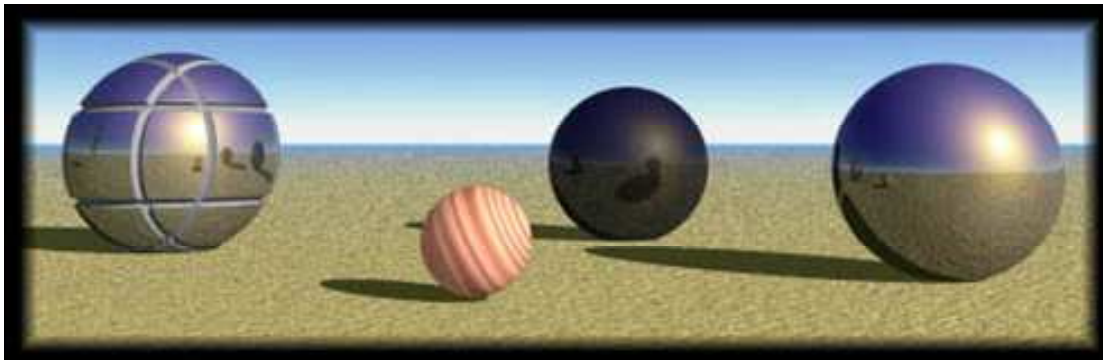
We are now approaching the 10th anniversary of this and feel it appropriate to once again record the village in this way, as so much has changed in terms of householders and, in some cases, houses too.

Threshing or Throsin' by Maureen Stollery

The season for threshing is again here, and Roger is knocking at our door to ask Brian for his help, with others, with the annual threshing.

For those who are not familiar with this annual event, it is when a machine separates the corn from the straw and was a common sight in the country-side until the late 50's.

Roger is our local thatcher and needs long straw to top off the ridge of a thatched roof. Very tall wheat is grown for the long straw needed and in the summer, when it's ripe, it is cut by binder to prevent damaging the stems of the straw. It is then bundled into sheaves,

loaded on to the trailers by hand using pitch forks and brought back to Pettistree. The sheaves will stay on the trailers until late September or early October when the threshing will take place. The day will start by setting up, as a tractor is needed to drive the machinery. A large belt running from the tractor to the threshing machine, sets a number of cogs, wheels, and belts in motion. Men standing on top of the corn on the trailer pass the sheaves, using pitch forks, to the man on the drum into which he feeds the sheaves after cutting the string. After being separated inside the drum the corn goes out the front into sacks and the straw out the



back tied with string and taken on to the stack by elevator for the men to stack. To be able to build a stack is a very special skill, as it has to stand through the storms of winter until it is needed.

The direst job has to be that of the chaffer, a man standing at the side of the threshing machine bagging up the husks of the corn which is called chaff and is often mixed with other food to feed cattle and horses. The chaffer will need to wear a mask and goggles and will end up black as the ace of spades because of the dust and dirt.

It is a very rare sight in the country- side now and can only be seen at gatherings such as Power of the Past and if you have taken part or stood to watch you will understand it was very hard work and not many people today will ever encounter such hard manual work.

Local Venison, Honey Roasted Carrots, Shallots & Parsnips with Game Sauce

Ingredients (Serves 6)

1kg Venison Loin
(trimmed - cut into 6 steaks)
10 Carrots
6 Parsnips
500g Shallots
Thyme
Red Wine
Meat Stock
Honey
Garlic
Butter
Salt & Pepper

1. Cut parsnips and carrots in half lengthways and parboil for ten minutes.
2. Strain off water. Place in baking trays with shallots, chopped garlic, thyme, salt and pepper, oil and honey to coat.
3. Roast until golden. (45 minutes to 1 hour)
4. Seal off seasoned venison in a hot pan (well seasoned meat).
5. Remove from pan, place on tray with knob of butter. Roast for 8 to 10 minutes until soft and pink. Leave to rest for 5 to 10 minutes before serving.
6. Using the venison pan put back on heat, deglaze pan with a glass of good red wine. Add half a pint of good meat stock. Pass through sieve and reduce by two thirds.
7. Sauce should have thickened slightly, be dark in colour and have a good game flavour.
8. Serve roasted vegetables with carved venison and spoon sauce over.

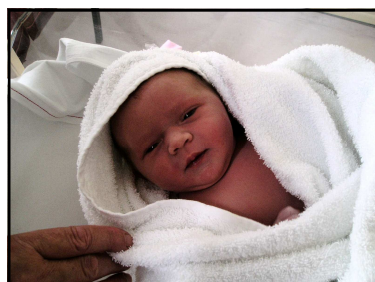
