Steve and David Boardley kindly allowed us to use the grounds and facilities at Hungarian Hall which allowed us to charge a significantly reduced entrance fee for adults and children. As with last year, the Pulse Ranger course in the forest, archery and laser clay pigeon proved really popular. This year, an inflatable 5-a-side human table soccer provided an amusing addition. VILLAGE HALL IMPROVEMENTS

No more Tchai Chilly, Burrrrn's Nights and carpet bowls with bobble hats and gloves. The village hall heating system (or non heating system to most users) has been replaced. Thanks to Cath, Maureen and Jeff for helping us with the process, The Committee applied for funding from Suffolk Councillor Michael Bond's "Locality Budget". A grant of £1500 was secured which allowed us to replace the heating system and upgrade the kitchen. As well as the new heaters the hall has a new cooker and freezer. The carpet bowlers were first to use the hall with the new system in place and were delighted with the balmy ambience (none of the team have told me if it made them play any better!). I understand that Eric complained it was too hot but no doubt his comment fell on stony ground.

The Committee is always looking for ways to improve the village hall for all the diverse groups that use it and we are hoping to replace the kitchen units in the next few months. Receiving the 'Locality Budget' funding was a real bonus but the profits raised from our events throughout the year will allow us to further improve the hall.

John Woods Nurseries

After the show, Upwardly Mobile relocated to the National Gardening Centre at Capel Manor College where key elements evolved into a family friendly back garden supported by the rear façade of a modern contemporary family home.

The theme of the Upwardly Mobile garden was to demonstrate how easy it is to create a garden and take your ideas with you when moving house during a lifetime.

This idea came from discussions between John Wood Nurseries and renowned gardening expert Peter Seabrook.

A broad collection of plants such as the Endless Summer® range of repeat flowering Hydrangeas including the new Twist 'n ShoutTM, the First Edition range evergreen Coprosma Pacific Sunset, and the first ever variegated Diervilla Cool SplashTM which brightens up dry shady areas; all complemented by Cornus Venus®, were some of the special plants used to show gardening need not be complicated.

Capel Manor College is in Enfield North London and the relocating of the Upwardly Mobile garden illustrates the flexibility and versatility of easy care plants and methods especially when moving house.

MATTOCKS launch three new roses

Mattocks Rose Nurseries were acquired by Notcutts in 1985 and in the takeover of 2007 became part of the John Woods Nurseries. At the RHS Hampton Court Palace Flower Show 2010 they were awarded a Gold medal for their stand. On the stand were three new roses.

The County of Staffordshire Rose. The Staffordshire Society founded by a group of London based Staffordshire gentlemen in 1905 discovered there was not a rose named for the County. This rose has won gold silver and bronze medals in international trials.

Joie de Vivre, a rose which lends itself to containers and was a silver medal winner at La Roeulx Belgium in 2006 and has been made Rose of the Year for 2011.

Pomponella, a floribunda which won ADR in 2006 plus international gold silver & bronze medals.

On the Sunday the pew runners and new altar furniture was dedicated by the archdeacon, the Venerable Judy Hunt and after the service she was able to meet most of the congregation while refreshments were served, in the churchyard on another lovely fine evening.

One of the wonderful things we have always found about living here is how helpful people are. We were committed to too many events during that weekend and so were unable to help get things ready, but everything was sorted, our small marquee efficiently put up, and even better within an hour of the end of the celebrations everything had been taken down, tables put away and the church and churchyard left as neat and tidy as before. I hope everyone realises what a great community this is to live in, where people care about their neighbours.

Car Parking

Over the last couple of years it has become obvious that at times the parking situation at some services in the church is causing difficulties both for the congregation and local residents. The PCC has applied for planning permission to have a small car-parking area in the churchyard between the Parish room and the hedge around the current grave plots. The churchyard will not have to be dug up as the surface planned is a plastic mesh through which the grasses and flowers can continue to grow. There will have to be a break in the hedge but this is planned to be as unobtrusive as possible. The Diocese have already approved the plans subject to us obtaining Suffolk Coastal's permission, and we hope that if this is granted the work can be completed before the winter.

Neighbourhood Watch News





Many of you will be aware that some Pettistree households and businesses have been the victims of crime in recent weeks. It is therefore a timely reminder that we should not be complacent in our efforts to protect our own, and our neighbours', properties. To help tackle these issues here are some suggestions:

- 1. Let your trusted neighbours know if you are going to be away. Advise them if someone is coming in to check your mail or water your garden, and which vehicles will be around.
- 2. Take down registration details of any vehicle that is not known to you it may be completely innocent, but equally, it could be a vital clue if a crime is committed. A registration number can always be discarded if not relevant, but can't be recorded later. By all means email me with these, including vehicle type, date, time and place observed.
- 3. Register with Police Direct to receive emails, phone messages or text messages about local crimes. Log on to www.policedirect.suffolk.police.uk or telephone 01473 613997.
- 4. Join our email contact list for Pettistree & Loudham messages about crimes committed in our area, or crime reduction information, will be circulated quickly and efficiently by blind copy by your local NHW co-ordinator. If you haven't already asked to be on this list, please contact me on: roguescottage@mypostoffice.co.uk
- 5. Be aware of your neighbours' usual routines so that you can log if something unusual happens this doesn't mean you are being nosey, just observant and aware.
- 6. Always phone the police on 999 if an incident is occurring.

We have a supply of yellow NHW stickers advising that you do not buy or sell at your door, together with a list of useful contact telephone numbers to use if someone asks to enter your property to do work. Please let me know if you would like some.

As a registered Neighbourhood Watch Scheme we are eligible for a reduced charge for the following property marking product (details forwarded by our Community Watch Liaison Officer at the police). If you are interested please let me know – we have 5 interested households at the moment (Aug 2010). Smartwater is a property marking product which helps link burglars to crime scenes and stolen property. It is a colourless liquid with a DNA-style code that is unique and permanent and can be traced back to the home it came from, forensically linking a person to a scene of crime. A separate batch is used at each address and details recorded for Smartwater's database.

The solution is easy to apply to the backs of all types of property. If you move home Smartwater can be quickly updated with your new address by telephone. This enables a trail of evidence to be maintained.

There is a special deal available to members of registered NHW schemes; if at least 10 members of a scheme wish to purchase a kit they can do so at the reduced price of £15 each and no ongoing charges. Otherwise it would cost them £60 and £60 per year to renew the licence.

NEW DISEASE HITS PETTISTREE

In late 2008 the first cases of the disease were reported and by February and March of 2009 it was spreading significantly. The disease became known as 'Peter's Tree Green Finger'.

The disease escalated through Spring and early Summer and by the last weekend in June 2009 a full scale epidemic was reported, with some 400 people from surrounding villages realising they were afflicted.

Strangely after the weekend symptoms subsided but at a meeting in the Greyhound (where else!) in late November the people who were most badly affected by 'Peter's Tree Green Finger' agreed that the disease would surface again in about 18 months time, peaking on 25th and 26th June 2011, and may even spread to Loudham.

You may have realised by now that I am referring to Pettistree with Loudham Open Gardens Weekend. It isn't too soon to be preparing ourselves as those wishing to participate will:-

- a) Need to keep the last weekend in June 2011 free.
- b) Start to redesign their gardens (only joking).

Parish Council News for Pettistree People August 2010

2010 has continued to be a remarkable year for weather. As this was first drafted the drought had broken with an inch of rain and our parched fields and gardens were starting to show some green again. Since then we have gone back to a more normal watery summer.

Roads in the village have suffered from the heat as they did from the ice and snow earlier. We had thought that the gritting of some of our roads would correct the winter damage but the grit appears to have not set well into the tar and some potholes were not filled before tarring and gritting. This is being taken up with the highways department as is the persisting sinkage of the central pothole in The Street near the Greyhound. We had suspected damage to the deep sewer but Anglian Water say that a video camera inspection of the sewer has not shown any damage or leakage.

Hedges that overgrow into the road are still a potential safety hazard and landowners must please ensure that their roadside hedges do not hang into the roadway. I am told that as a last resort the highways department will cut the hedges and charge the landowners for the work. We hope that our hedgecutter will be back this Autumn so let me know (Tel No 01728 746 210) if you want to be included in his round.

The Parish Council is sorry that our Parish Clerk, Mike Flanagan is leaving us. He and his wife are moving to Shropshire and we do of course offer our best wishes for their new life in a very different part of the country. Mike has helped us for the last two years with great good humour and has got the accounts and other formalities of running a parish council into good order. We have been very lucky in obtaining the services of Mr Clive Mann to replace Mike in this important part-time paid post.

In recent weeks we have had an unaccustomed mini crime wave with daytime burglaries in houses that were locked but left vacant for a short time. Some arrests have been made but it is too soon to say if this will bring the problem to an end. Please sign up for "Police Direct" to get the earliest informative emails, and remember to note details of any unfamiliar vans or other vehicles that you may see.

The Parish Council has decided that the question of affordable housing should be "put on ice" for the time being. Very little interest was shown in a new questionnaire and it seems unlikely that landowners would make land available. The money that would have been spent on preparatory surveys will now be spent on current village projects such as upgrading the Village Hall and perhaps a small "green" car park area near the Church (to reduce road blockage during village events).

The vacancy on the Parish Council will probably be filled by the co-option of Terry Rowles at the next Parish Council Meeting on 7th September. He has put his name forward, and nobody requested an election, so co-option is the correct procedure. Terry will bring a lot of useful experience to our discussions.

fifth generation, quite a record and a very happy one.




